rant (verb, noun) — to speak or shout in a loud, angry, or impassioned way

- He started to rant about how unfair the system was.
- I'm tired of her constant rants about politics.

**solid** (adjective) — reliable, good, or of strong quality

- She gave a solid performance in the final.
- That's a solid plan let's go for it.

**barely** (adverb) — almost not; only just

- I barely passed the exam.
- We could barely hear each other over the noise.

**surprise**, **surprise** (*phrase*) — used sarcastically to say something is not surprising at all

- He forgot my birthday again surprise, surprise.
- The meeting was delayed surprise, surprise.

**harass** (verb) — to annoy or trouble someone repeatedly

- Stop harassing your sister.
- She was harassed by constant phone calls.

**rote-learn** (*verb*) — to memorize information by repeating it without understanding

- In some schools, students just rote-learn facts.
- I had to rote-learn all the capitals for the quiz.

#### **no wonder** (phrase) — it's not surprising

- No wonder you're tired you've been working nonstop.
- He's always late. No wonder no one trusts him.

#### investigate (verb) — to carefully examine a situation to learn the facts

- The police are investigating the robbery.
- I need to investigate this topic before I write my essay.

# nonstop (adjective, adverb) — without a break or pause

- He talks nonstop about football.
- We worked nonstop for twelve hours.

### half the time (phrase) — in many or most cases; often

- Half the time I don't know what he's saying.
- I forget my phone at home half the time.

# **ghost** (verb) — to suddenly cut off all communication with someone

- She ghosted me after our third date.
- Don't just ghost your friends tell them if something's wrong.
